Leaving Certificate

Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme

Cashel Community School also provides students with the option of availing of an enhanced version of the existing Leaving Certificate known as the Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) which establishes links between school and society through modules on preparation for work and enterprise education. This allows them to add modules on Preparation for Work and Enterprise Education to their Leaving Certificate subjects.

Transition Year

Transition Year is an extra year at Senior Cycle which allows the student to mature as a person, develop a wide range of skills and experience the adult world of work.

TY Project

Once again this year all TY students are involved in an ongoing and formal project. The projects are in the following 7 areas: Business; Music; Computers; Woodwork; Art; Young Social Innovators (YSI) and Young Scientist Competition. Each student chose one area in September.



- The business project has opened a school bank called the 'Penny Wise Bank'. This project, which encourages and facilitates saving by students, is being run in conjunction with the local A.I.B. branch. The group has also entered the 'Build a Bank' Competition. Fundraising for the Alzheimer's Society of Ireland and the Motor Neuron Association is also part of this year's Bank Challenge.
- The computer group is helping to develop and update the School's website and is also producing an E News bulletin on TY activities, during the year.
- The woodwork group is involved in a number of related Projects, including the set for the school musical as well as a Project to achieve a goal connected with the area of social responsibility.
- The art group has been very busy with the Set for the Musical. Following this, the group will continue last year's project involving the processing of imagery, using graphic applications, in the form of a Mural. The finished Mural will be displayed on TY Graduation night.
- The Y.S.I. group have a new project this year, entitled 'CCS Sound-Out'. This project
 will involve turning up the volume on how we are 'sound'. The project is being done in
 collaboration with Pieta House and will ultimately take the form of initiatives to raise
 awareness of the importance of our Mental Health.

Young Social Innovators (YSI)

Working in teams of five to 25, TY students identify a social issue of concern to them, explore it and come up with real actions and responses. YSI features regional and national events to which participants are invited. The programme is youth-led, team-based and action-focused.

First Year Induction & Links Programme

Student Council

The Student Council has been functioning in Cashel Community School since 1997. The Council provides a forum for students to express their opinions and enables them to play a partnership role with the staff, Parents' Association and Board of Management.

This ensures that the students play a positive role in our school's decision making process. A member of staff is responsible for liaising

between Principal and Council. The Council meets on a regular basis and delegates report to their classes after every meeting.

The student council has been involved in organising various events such as the variety show and fundraising for local and national charities. Senior members co-ordinate the production of the 6th year Yearbook, the Class Mural and the Graduation night.









Pastoral Care

- All members of management and staff exercise a caring role towards the students.
- Each class group is assigned a Class Tutor. This teacher regularly
 monitors the progress and welfare of each student. To assist
 with this there are scheduled Pastoral Care periods throughout
 the year.
- Each Year Head sees to the overall progress and welfare of his/ her Year Group.
- The Career Guidance Counsellors and School Chaplain are always readily available to assist students who may need personal support.
- Students, of their own accord, can directly approach the Chaplain
 or Guidance Counsellors. In addition, parents/guardians,
 management and staff members may request support for a
 student. The Guidance Counsellors and Chaplain each have their
 own office where they meet with students individually.
- The School Chaplain gives students spiritual guidance.

Literacy and Numeracy Initiative

As part of school self evaluation and school development students in first and second year are enthusiastically participating in 'Drop Everything and Read' programme and also in a 'Book in a Bag' programme. These programmes are designed to encourage reading for pleasure which will have a positive impact on students' progress in the education system.

Learning Support Department

Cashel Community School provides a comprehensive Learning Support Service for pupils who have learning difficulties. The Department has five qualified Learning Support Teachers and eight Special Needs Assistants.

Learning Support targets the needs of pupils based on their individual assessments providing support on an individual or small group basis.

Asperger Resource Centre

Cashel Community School in co-operation with the Department of Education and Skills operates a centre for students with Asperger Syndrome. Contact the Principal for further details.

Curriculum

Information Technology

Cashel Community School was one of the first post-primary schools approved by the Minister for Communications for the delivery of 100MB Hi-Speed Broadband connectivity. We now have:

- A Hi-Speed Broadband connection in all classrooms.
- The provision of a laptop for teaching and learning in classrooms.
- The provision of digital data projection in classrooms.

The investment has greatly increased the opportunity for students to access and benefit from the schools extensive computer facilities.

The two main computer rooms in the school are equipped with up to date operating systems and software along with printing and scanning facilities for students. Students can research material on the Internet using 100mb Hi-Speed Broadband which can be accessed in all rooms in the school.













Adult Education Programme

A comprehensive range of Adult Education courses are provided by Cashel Community School. Courses ranging from Hobbies, Computer, Language, Arts & Crafts, Personal & Professional Development are on offer. Courses commence in Autumn and Spring and take place on Monday and Tuesday nights.

Food Options

Cashel Community School endeavours to promote and encourage healthy eating by offering freshly prepared food low in sugar, salt and fat. Students have a choice of rolls, wraps, toasted sandwiches, soups and hot main courses at lunchtime. Bottled water and tea may be purchased in school but fizzy drinks and high sugar juices cannot be bought in school. The school shop operates at break and lunchtime. Soups and snacks are available after school.

The introduction of quality hot food was a student/staff/parent initiative and is monitored regularly by the school's Healthy Eating Committee.

CCS Scholarships

The Meaney Scholarship

The 'Meaney Scholarship' is funded from a bequest to the school from the late Patrick Meaney Esq. He was a local businessman and farmer who bequeathed the proceeds from the sale of his book collection to the school. We are profoundly grateful for this extraordinary philanthropic gesture and we are deeply

appreciative of the opportunity it will afford students to pursue their studies at third level. This scholarship will be awarded to student(s) of Cashel Community School who are studying in a National University of Ireland college.

Godolphin Bursary 2018

This bursary is open to all students at Cashel Community School who will sit the Leaving Certificate in June 2019. It will be awarded to a student who intends to continue full-time study at an institute of technology or university in Ireland, or at an equivalent institution overseas.

The recipient will receive a laptop computer along with €1,500 per year of third level study paid in two annual payments of €750 each.

It is a condition of the bursary award that recipients give a commitment to undertake a minimum of 100 hours of voluntary work per 12-month period for the duration of the bursary. Voluntary work can be undertaken with charities, community groups or sporting organisations.

First Year Hurling Scholarship

The **Friends of CCS GAA Support Group** is an independent body working to provide support for GAA activities in Cashel Community School. This sees the awarding of a scholarship to a First Year hurler who displays characteristics such as leadership, being a team player, commitment to training and working hard academically. This scholarship will be an annual event and will reimburse the winner the costs of attending First Year in CCS as well as providing support to help this player to develop his skills. 



Junior Cycle

Junior Cycle

Junior Cycle: A broad education for your child

The new junior cycle will place the student at the centre of the learning process. It allows for new ways of learning and a broader range of skills to be properly assessed. This leaflet aims to inform parents of post-primary school students about the key changes underway.

Principles, Key Skills and Statements of Learning

Underpinning the new junior cycle are a set of principles, key skills and statements of learning. These will ensure that your child receives a rich educational experience that has both breadth and depth. Your child will have access to a varied curriculum of knowledge, understandings, skills and values.

Eight principles underpin the framework for Junior Cycle. These inform the planning for, as well as the development and implementation of, junior cycle programmes in all schools. The eight principles of Junior Cycle are:-

- Learning to Learn
- Choice and Flexibility
- Quality
- Creativity and Innovation
- Engagement and Participation
- Continuity and Development
- Inclusive Education
- Wellbeing

Eight key skills permeate across the entire curriculum



Through engaging with the key skills students will:

- be more actively engaged with learning
- take greater ownership of their learning
- have a critical engagement with digital technology
- be encouraged to problem solve and think critically and creatively

The twenty-four statements of learning describe what your child should know, understand and value having participated in junior cycle. Schools will ensure that all statements of learning feature in the programme offered to their junior cycle students.

How student achievement at Junior Cycle will be assessed The most significant change in the new Junior Cycle is in the area of assessment. A dual approach to assessment, involving classroom-based assessment across the three years and a final externally-assessed, state-certified examination can enable the appropriate balance between preparing students for examinations and facilitating creative thinking, engaged learning and better outcomes for students. From Autumn

2017, junior cycle students will receive a new Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA). The JCPA will reflect a much wider range of your child's achievements over the three years of junior cycle. The JCPA will report on a number of areas, including:-

- 1. Subjects (State Examinations and Assessment Task)
- 2. Classroom Based Assessments
- 3. Other Learning Experiences



The state examination that students sit in their subject at the end of their junior cycle will also be graded differently. Instead of A, B, C, D, E, F and NG the following descriptors will now be used:

Distinction	90	to	100%
Higher Merit	75	to	89 %
Merit	55	to	74 %
Achieved	40	to	54 %
Partially Achieved	20	to	39 %
(not graded)	0	to	19%





Classroom Based Assessments

Classroom Based Assessments (CBAs) provide students with opportunities to demonstrate their learning and skills in ways not possible in a pen and paper examination, for example, their verbal communication and investigation skills. CBAs will be undertaken in subjects and short courses and will be facilitated by the classroom teacher.

CBAs will be undertaken during a defined time period within normal class contact time and to a national timetable. Students will com-plete one CBA in second year and one in third year in most subjects.

CBAs will be reported on in the JCPA using the following descriptors:-

- Exceptional
- Above Expectations
- In Line with Expectations
- Yet to Meet Expectations

Once the second Classroom-Based Assessment (CBA) is completed, students in third year will complete a written Assessment Task on what they have learned and the skills and competences that they have developed in that assessment. This task, set by the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA), is undertaken during normal class time and will be sent to the State Examinations Commission (SEC) for marking. This Assessment Task will account for 10% of the overall mark for the final examination. Specific arrangements are made for Visual Art, Music, Home Economics and the Technology subjects. At the end of third year, students will sit the final SEC examination in June, which will account for 90% of the SEC grade.



Other Learning Experiences

Students will have the opportunity to engage with a range of other learning experiences as part of their junior cycle programme and these can be recorded on the JCPA. Other learning experiences play a critical role in ensuring that students are provided with a broad and balanced educational experience. These learning experiences could include student engagement in a science fair, a musical performance or a debating competition.

They could also include extracurricular activities, such as:

- membership of the school student council or school clubs and societies
- participation in school sporting activities

Reporting in Junior Cycle

A new reporting structure at junior cycle will contribute to the personal and educational development of students. It will support and underpin ongoing learning and assessment.

Schools will regularly:

- Provide information to parents about their child's achievement and progress
- Support students in their learning by suggesting next steps and providing feedback to help students' selfevaluation

The reporting process at junior cycle will culminate in the award of the JCPA to students. The JCPA will be awarded for the first time in Autumn 2017.

Student Wellbeing

Your child's wellbeing is of central importance to his/her educational success and overall happiness. Wellbeing will become a core part of your child's junior cycle experience. This area of learning includes, amongst others, Physical Education (PE), Civic, Social and Political Education (CSPE), Social, Personal and Health Education (SPHE) [including Relationship and Sexuality Education (RSE)] and Guidance.


GUIDELINES FOR WELLBEING IN JUNIOR CYCLE, NCCA


SIX INDICATORS OF WELLBEING




